CWU RESEARCHER RECEIVES NSF GRANT

The National Science Foundation has awarded an \$840,000 grant to Central Washington University for continued research at Soap Lake.

Dr. Holly Pinkart, CWU biology professor and a member of the Soap Lake Conservancy Science Advisory Board, is the principal investigator for the grant. The three-year NSF funding will allow for development of a microbial observatory at the lake.

"Soap Lake is an excellent choice for an observatory because of its unique chemistry," Pinkart says.

The lake, created by the Glacial Missoula Floods more than 10,000 years ago, is atypical in that it consists of two separate water layers that have not mixed for more than 2,000 years. Although both layers are alkaline, the lower layer is more saline. The lake also contains sulfide, which is generally considered toxic for most life forms. Even so, it supports thriving communities of algae, zooplankton and bacteria.

The observatory will allow for study of the ecology and the relatively unknown microorganisms that thrive in the extreme environment, and determine how they affect - and are affected by - the geochemistry of Soap Lake.

Results generated by the project will supplement data available in the search for biological activity on Mars and extra-solar terrestrial environments.

CWU GEOLOGICAL SCIENCES STUDENT WINS AWARD

Central Washington University student Ashley Streig received the Outstanding Student Paper Award in tectonophysics - the study of rock deformation - at the national meeting of the American Geophysical Union (AGU) in Washington, D.C., May 28-31.

"This is the major professional meeting for solid-earth, ocean, atmospheric and planetary scientists," Dr. Charles Rubin, CWU geological sciences chair, says.

At the conference, Streig made a poster presentation, titled "Evidence for Prehistoric Coseismic Folding Along the Tsaotun Segment of the Chelungpu Fault Near Nan-Tou, Taiwan: Seismic Hazard Along Active Fold Scarps," concerning the 1999 magnitude 7.6 Chi-Chi earthquake in central Taiwan.

A 2000 graduate of Occidental College, in Los Angeles, the Watsonville, Calif., native is pursuing a master's degree in geology at CWU. She is currently in Taiwan, supported by a National Science Foundation summer research fellowship.

It's rare for master's degree students to receive awards of this magnitude, which generally are novel microorganisms that may be useful in industry and biotechnology," Pinkart adds. "Additionally, this project will allow for significant involvement of undergraduate students."

LEARNING ON WHEELS PROGRAM TO BEGIN

By fall, the Open Spaces Technology Center (OSTC) "mobile technology classroom" will be hitting the road in Kittitas County.

The mobile classroom is actually a custom-built, 37-foot Winnebago outfitted with a networked, 12-station computer classroom, which will provide outreach technology training throughout the county. It's being manufactured by Winnebago Industries of Forest City, Iowa.

OSTC, a community-based technology training center, works in conjunction with other community organizations, including WorkSource, Phoenix Economic Development Group, Yakima Valley Community College, Ellensburg Chamber of Commerce, City of Ellensburg Recreation Department and the United Way of Kittitas County, to provide access to computers and computer training at locations throughout Kittitas County. The goal is to produce a better-trained workforce and more technologysavvy citizens.

OSTC, through the Central Washington University office of continuing education, has received funding from the U.S. Department of Education and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, a portion of which is funding development and operation of the new mobile classroom.

Dorothy Purser, professor of physical education at Central Washington University, passed away Sunday, July 28, at her Ellensburg home with her family at her side.

A Rigby, Idaho, native, Purser, 71, joined the school's faculty in 1957. Because of a mix-up that resulted in too many dance teachers being hired for one position at the then Central Washington College of Education, Purser, who was expecting to teach ballroom and folk dancing, was switched to instructing first aid.

That proved to be a boon to the university. Purser expanded first-aid instruction from the "band-aid and splint state" to emergency medical technician (EMT) training and paramedic preparation. Through her work, the CWU program is now nationally accredited and internationally recognized.

She also was named to the CWU Athletic Hall of Fame in 1985; honored by the Associated Students of CWU as a "prominent community figure" in 1991; and named a "woman of achievement" by the CWU empowerment center in 1999.

Prior to coming to Ellensburg, Purser taught in Arco, Idaho. She received her bachelor's degree from Ricks College in Rexburg, Idaho, and her master's of education degree from the University of Idaho, Moscow.
